
Understanding Risk-Taking

Alan Petersen is Professor in Sociology at Monash University. He is a renowned expert in health and risk. He is known for 'The new public health: Health and self in the age of risk' and his research on governance, nanotechnology and genetics in medicine.

Signe Ravn is a Senior Lecturer in Sociology at the University of Melbourne. Her research focuses on youth, risk and risk-taking, as well as gender, disadvantage, and processes of marginalisation in youth transitions to adulthood. In 2019 she published the co-authored book 'Youth, Risk, Routine. A New Approach to Understanding Risk-Taking in Young Lives' (Routledge) with Dr Tea Torbenfeldt Bengtsson.

Jens O. Zinn is T.R. Ashworth Associate Professor in Sociology at the University of Melbourne and is internationally known for his work on risk and risk taking. His recent work explores everyday strategies to deal with risk and uncertainty and discourse-semantic changes of risk and related concepts. In 2015 he received the Friedrich Wilhelm Bessel Award for his scholarly achievements.
