Sociology needs Indigenous scholars. Reflections in recent years have highlighted the paucity of Indigenous Australian perspectives in sociology scholarship. Despite this shortfall, Indigenous sociologists and allies are highly research productive in areas of the sociology of sport, health and wellbeing, politics and policy, intimacy, identity, digital technology, and popular culture.

In 2021, the Critical Indigenous Studies thematic group with The Australian Sociological Association is compiling a special issue of the Journal of Global Indigeneity (JGI) that showcases current Indigenous Studies and Indigenous Sociological research. JGI is a unique and innovative digital journal that publishes special themed issues in an effort to engage with academics and Indigenous communities and to encourage the relationship between theory and praxis — especially as it relates to Indigenous research and scholarship.

The complete papers for this special issue will be presented in person (where possible) at Macquarie University's new Arts Precinct in September 2021. The goal is to showcase the research that members of the Critical Indigenous Studies thematic group, and members of TASA more broadly, are undertaking.

This special issue and corresponding symposium will showcase the breadth and diversity of Indigenous sociologists' scholarship, the scholarship of our allies, and future contributions that will be made by Indigenous sociologists.

We call for papers from Indigenous sociologists and cross-disciplinary researchers that demonstrate contemporary directions in Indigenous scholarship. We particularly welcome papers which look to Indigenous peoples' and communities' political, social, and cultural futures.
